# 70th ANNIVERSARY



## August 2nd: A Landmark in NPH History

August 2nd is a special date in the NPH calendar, but in 2024, it held even greater significance as we celebrated our 70th anniversary. The day was filled with joy, gratitude, and a profound sense of family, bringing together children, staff, and Hermanos Mayores (former NPH youth who remain part of the NPH family) for a celebration like no other.

The highlight of the morning was a Mass led by the late Fr. Philip Cleary, who sadly passed in October of the same year. Supporting the service were NPH Mexico National Director Rafael Bermúdez, Bishop of the Diocese of San Pedro de Macorís, Santiago Rodríguez, and NPH Dom. Rep. National Director Kieran Rigney.

The Mass set the tone for a day of reflection, unity, and appreciation for the incredible journey NPH has undertaken over the past seven decades. After the service, the celebration continued in true NPH spirit—full of life, laughter, and community. A thrilling soccer match brought together Hermanos Mayores, many of whom had not seen each other in years, rekindling friendships and reminiscing about their time growing up at NPH. Meanwhile, children and parents enjoyed fun rides, filling the air with excitement and laughter. True to tradition, the celebration was complemented by a delightful array of Mexican cuisine, including tacos, quesadillas, and other cherished local dishes, shared among long-time friends and new acquaintances alike.

The event took place at Casa San Salvador, a residential service that has provided love, security, and opportunity to thousands of children and youth over the years. It was a day to celebrate not just the past, but the present and future of NPH, reaffirming our commitment to transforming lives.



## Expanding Our Reach Beyond the Residential Services

Since the 1990s, NPH has expanded its impact beyond its residential services to serve children and families in surrounding communities. Some key milestones include:

**MEXICO** (1997): Supporting over 500 children close to waste disposal sites in Milpillas with school access, meals, and medical care.

**HAITI** (1989): St. Damien Pediatric Hospital, now Haiti's leading pediatric facility, providing over 58,000 services annually.

**DOMINICAN REPUBLIC** (2006): Education programs for children in Batey communities.

**GUATEMALA** (2008): Affordable education for 250+ disadvantaged students annually.

**HAITI**: (2008): NPH Haiti's Special Needs Program launched Kay Germaine to provide specialized education and rehabilitation for children and young people with disabilities. In 2013, Kay Gabriel was added to offer rehabilitative therapy for children and adults with neurological disorders, including stroke survivors, treating over 500 outpatients and 72 students from Kay Germaine. Kay Eliane offers a safe space for young adults who graduated from Kay Germaine and Kay Christine, focusing on skill development and community integration.

**HAITI** (2010): Father Wasson Angels of Light (FWAL) school, which was formed in the displacement camps in the aftermath of the Haiti earthquake, now serving 900+ students.

**NICARAGUA** (2010): Casa Samaritano, supporting children with disabilities.

**HONDURAS** (2010): Initiatives like a soup kitchen, education programs, and daycare for single mothers.

**GUATEMALA & EL SALVADOR** (2010): Daycare centers for at-risk families.

**HONDURAS** (2019): San José Family Center provides healthcare, psychosocial support, and education.

**NICARAGUA** (2021): A school serving the community, providing education to children from surrounding areas.

**GUATEMALA** (2022): Fr. Wasson Family Center specialized therapies and family workshops to support children with disabilities.





## Seven Decades of Love and Transformation

In 1954, a desperate young boy stole from a church collection box, seeking nothing more than survival. Instead of punishment, he found compassion in Fr. William B. Wasson, whose simple act of mercy laid the foundation for Nuestros Pequeños Hermanos. Inspired by Matthew 25—“Whatever you did for the least of my brothers and sisters, you did for me”—this mission of love has since touched the lives of tens of thousands of children across Latin America.

As we reflect on our 70th anniversary, we celebrate our journey while recognizing the evolving challenges children face today. NPH continues to provide not only a residential service for vulnerable children but also innovative programs that address the root causes of poverty.



Through it all, the spirit of Fr. Wasson continues to inspire us. He was a man who responded to hardship with action and love, always putting children first. As we look ahead, we remain dedicated to his vision—ensuring every child has the opportunity to grow, thrive, and build a brighter future.

# A GOAL FOR PEACE

## The Stories Behind the Fr. Wasson NPH International Football Tournament Celebrating 70 Years of Impact

### “I played the final with dengue fever”

Jesus Estrada, a young man raised at NPH Guatemala, played the final match of the NPH soccer tournament despite battling a high fever. *“I felt very unwell the whole match... but I wanted to represent NPH Guatemala very well, and that’s why I held out until the last minute,”* he said.

After the match, while resting, he was surprised by Carlos, an NPH caregiver: *“Jesus, Jesus, get up, you’re going to Spain, you won one of the scholarships!”* Jesus sprang out of bed and ran to the field to the applause of over 500 cheering youths.

In 2025, Jesus will begin studying Physical Education at a university in Chimaltenango. A goalkeeper inspired by Real

Madrid’s Kaylor Navas, he shared, *“I am a fan of Real Madrid, but I am happy to go to Barcelona... maybe I will end up at Barcelona F.C.,”* smiling at the dream

The tournament was transformative: *“I now have friends in several countries... it was also very nice to play in mixed teams, to play with girls from other countries,”* he said. He also praised his coach, Jessica, for her discipline and leadership.

Jesus closed with a message to his peers: *“Always fight for your dreams... there is no obstacle, no matter how big, that prevents us from achieving what we really want.”*



## From Honduras to Barcelona, Spain:

Angel, a young soccer talent from Honduras, is beginning to live his dream of traveling to Spain, thanks to a partnership between NPH Spain and the Marcet Foundation. He is one of five youths selected to train in Barcelona as part of the Fr. Wasson NPH 70th anniversary soccer tournament.

Angel, who studies at the NPH school in Honduras, was chosen by his coach after standing out in the tournament in Guatemala. *"The trip from Olancho to Guatemala was long, but very, very fun,"* Angel recalls, adding how warmly they were welcomed by NPH Guatemala.

His parents, Gladys and Miguel Ángel, are proud and emotional. Angel grew up playing soccer in his community and has long dreamed of Barcelona. *"Since I was very young, I had the dream of getting to know Spain, but especially Barcelona because I am a fan of Barcelona F.C.,"* he says.

Thanks to this opportunity, Angel is not only growing as a player but also taking the first step toward fulfilling a lifelong dream.

## For the Inclusive Right to Play Soccer

After a game during the NPH soccer tournament in Guatemala, Estefania, a young Honduran player, expressed frustration: "I am furious, it is incredible that being a mixed team, the men do not pass the ball to us women. Do they not trust us?" Her words sparked a broader conversation among her teammates, highlighting a lack of inclusion on the field.

When the boys heard their concerns, one of them admitted: "Estefania and the rest of the teammates are right, we are not really including women in the team... At NPH, they have taught us about equality... we could put it into practice here."

Months later, Estefania noted some improvement: "Yes, there were some changes... but there needs to be greater awareness among men about the importance of equality... in every activity in life." She emphasized the need for girls to speak up: "We need more empowered girls in our societies, women with character, we need more Chicas Poderosas."

Estefania, a Physical Therapy student in Tegucigalpa, has played soccer since childhood and has always valued the role of sports at NPH. The tournament was her first trip abroad. "When I tried the food in Guatemala, I liked it, and I even missed it for a long time," she laughed.

For her, the tournament was more than just games—it was a chance to build friendships, experience new cultures, and grow as part of the NPH family. "The youth meeting was a nice experience... my suggestion is that young people organize more activities and be the leaders of these."



# FAMILY WELLBEING

## Transforming Futures: The Power of Family Support and Child Well-Being at NPH El Salvador

Driving down the dirt road to NPH El Salvador for the first time in December 2024, I was accompanied by Dora Serrano, the national director. As we passed through the surrounding community, she gestured toward a modest home and told me about the family who lived there. The mother, raising her children alone, had faced immense challenges. Thanks to NPH, every one of her children received an education, mentorship, and the support they needed to thrive.

She shared how the oldest now has a job in Santa Ana, while the younger siblings are either in school or benefiting from scholarships. I asked, *"Are there other schools nearby?"* Dora shook her head. *"No, NPH El Salvador is their best option."*

This family is not alone. They are one of many who have transformed their futures by placing the well-being of the child, youth, adolescent, and family at the center of everything we do. That philosophy drives NPH El Salvador—and is the same inspiration I see across eight other countries. It is why I want to be part of this mission: to ensure that a vulnerable child is no longer vulnerable.

My entire career has been dedicated to child protection and family support. I have led initiatives that created lasting change, from managing protection centers to designing family reintegration programs that were recognized by governments and adopted as models for sustainable solutions. My experience in policy implementation, conflict resolution, and project development for child welfare and migration has reinforced my belief in the power of intentional, guided care.

At NPH, I have found an organization with deeply rooted values, committed to the well-being of children and families. My promise is to always prioritize children, youth, and families, ensuring that every decision and initiative is designed to provide them with security, education, and opportunity.

I am honored to lead a team of dedicated experts who share this vision. Together with Alicia Grünig, Disability and Inclusion Coordinator; Nelly Fernandez, Mental Health and Youth Development Coordinator; Marta Baca, Medical Services Coordinator; Digiya Hernandez, Education and

Development Coordinator; Ricardo Velasco Klayen, Youth and Economic Empowerment Coordinator; and our newest team member, Doris Ferrufino, Coordinator of Reintegration, Family, and Community Strengthening, we will continue to build a future where no child is left behind.

With passion and determination, we will work tirelessly to reinforce family structures, create opportunities, and empower vulnerable children and youth to break the cycle of poverty. Together, we will continue to make a difference—one child, one family, and one community at a time.

It is important to highlight that we are making significant progress, such as the development of a tool to ensure the quality of Family Reintegration services across all NPH offices. We began this restructuring process with the Permanency Map methodology in Honduras, where we already have positive reports. Although there has been some resistance to change among a sector of our staff, we are moving forward.

The Permanency Map is a methodology designed and adapted to our realities; it is an NPHI product intended for use across all local offices. We are actively working on the relevant training and implementation processes.

Additionally, we are establishing partnerships with other institutions to strengthen the skills and knowledge of all NPH professionals and collaborators. We have signed a cooperation agreement with NYAP (National Youth Advocate Program) (<https://www.nyap.org>), which will provide training for our professionals in areas such as TBRI, CPI, SELF, and Trauma Intervention. We are also finalizing a collaboration agreement with FAMISAL (<https://famisal.com>), which will train 15 of our professionals in the field of Community Centers. This will help promote the integral and healthy development of children and adolescents by strengthening vulnerable families' capacity to address key health determinants, while also protecting their rights and preventing domestic violence.

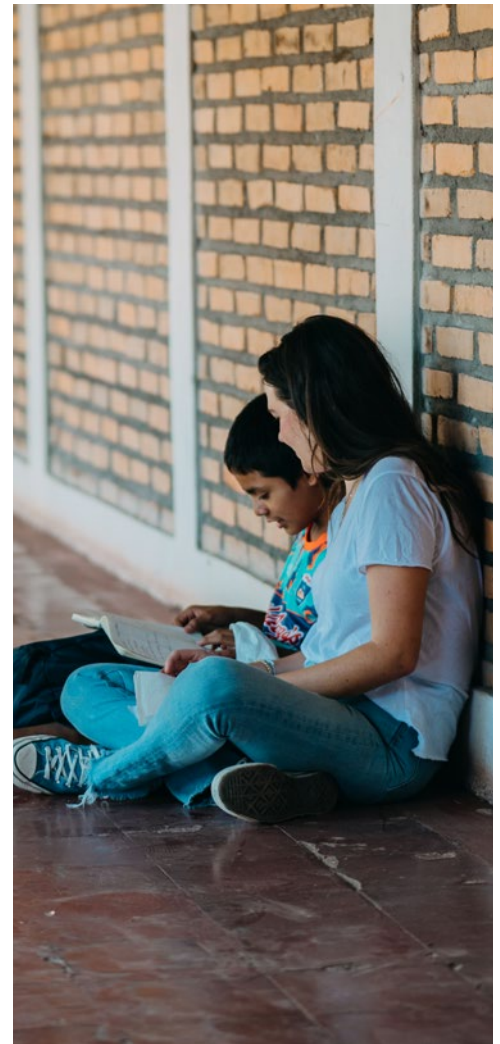

## Driving Change in 2024: NPH's Commitment to Sustainable Development and Empowering Youth

In 2024, Latin America continues to face significant challenges in achieving the Sustainable Development Goals and protecting human and child rights, with uneven progress across the region. Despite notable advancements in areas such as education, renewable energy, and healthcare access, many remain left behind.

However, NPH, as a Civil Society Organization, and our regional partnerships are playing a pivotal role in empowering vulnerable children and families across the communities we serve. NPH is deeply interconnected with other institutions—governmental, private, and non-profit. These partnerships are vital to the success of our regional programs, forming an essential bridge between citizens and the state, contributing to social development and the protection of human and child rights. By prioritizing the rights of children, we recognize their inherent dignity, individuality, and the need for their voices to be heard.

In 2024, NPH sent a group of delegates for the first time to the United Nations Headquarters in New York to

participate in the Summit of the Future Action Days. In 2025, NPH looks forward to continuing its presence at high-level debates, fostering a sense of global citizenship and solidarity, and ensuring that the next generation is prepared to champion sustainable development and build a more just and inclusive world.

### Residential Care



In 2024, we transitioned to a family-based care model, creating a home-like environment that fosters stronger caregiver-child bonds. We integrated children into the community through education and recreational activities, reinforcing their social connections. By upholding children's rights, we ensured access to quality education, participation in decisions, and a safe environment for growth.

### Youth Empowerment



This program supported young adults transitioning from residential care to independent living. We focused on job placement and rebuilding social networks, equipping them with the tools needed for self-sufficiency.

### Family Reintegration



Through personalized plans, we strengthened family bonds, improved economic stability, and enhanced housing conditions. Parental skill workshops, recognized by local authorities, empowered families to create safer homes. Seed capital initiatives enabled economic growth, ensuring long-term stability.

## Our Happiest Moment

The most rewarding moments come when children are reunited with their families in safe, loving environments. Witnessing a child's embrace with their parents after months or years apart, seeing their trust restored, and observing their emotional healing is profoundly moving. Each reunion represents not just a homecoming but the restoration of dignity, security, and a hopeful future. These moments reaffirm our mission and inspire us to continue this vital work.

## Success in Our Focus Areas

### Education and Development



One of our greatest achievements was celebrating the academic progress of our children and youth. Nineteen children graduated from Kindergarten, marking the beginning of their primary education, while fifteen young men and women completed Ninth Grade, preparing to enter High School. These milestones reflect their dedication and growth, reinforcing our mission to provide them with opportunities for a brighter future.



## Our Happiest Moment

A deeply rewarding moment has been witnessing the transformation of children in our Early Childhood program (Centro de Bienestar Infantil). Many arrive malnourished and struggling with basic development, yet with proper nutrition, care, and emotional support, they regain their strength, adapt to our programs, and express excitement about returning each day. Their joy and progress inspire us to continue our work with unwavering commitment.

## Goals for 2025

## Success in Our Focus Areas

### Overcoming Challenges



In 2024, we continued to navigate the profound challenges facing the country, providing critical services to children and adults with disabilities while expanding its impact in new ways. Despite the instability, we are grateful to have remained safe and able to move forward with important initiatives that bring hope to many families.

### Expanding Hope



This year, construction advanced on our new Special Education and Rehabilitation Center in the mountains. The building will include dedicated areas for education, therapy, and workshops. Members of our community have already been contributing to the project by creating crafts from recycled materials, some of which were successfully sold in Port-au-Prince. We are excited to see the positive impact this center will bring once it opens.

### Enhancing Recreational Spaces



Recognizing the importance of inclusive play, we completed a new playground for children, featuring wheelchair-accessible swings and safe play areas. Our residents proudly helped design and paint, further fostering community spirit and ownership.

### Growth in Our Residential Care



We currently care for 53 residents. Over the past two years, due to escalating violence, we welcomed an additional 26 children and young adults with disabilities. This led to the restoration and reopening of two previously used residential houses, helping us meet the urgent need for space and services.



## Our Happiest Moment

Our rehabilitation center in Tabarre, located in a high-risk zone, faced significant challenges due to gang violence. Despite security threats and occasional closures, over 80 students were enrolled for the new school year, including two sets of twins with mobility challenges. Their access to education has provided vital relief for their families.

Throughout 2024, our therapy team provided:

- Rehabilitation services to over 270 adults and 225 children.
- Two rounds of food donations to families and staff facing food insecurity.
- Monthly funding for seizure medications for 23 vulnerable families, helping prevent life-threatening health crises for children.

## Goals for 2025

For 2025, our goals are clear:

- To ensure the safety and well-being of our residents and staff,
- To complete and open the new Special Education and Rehabilitation Center,
- To sustain and expand our life-changing programs for children and families living with disabilities.

We are deeply grateful to our supporters for standing with us through these unprecedented times. Your belief in our mission makes our work — and the miracles we witness each day — possible.

In a year marked by political instability, insecurity, and systemic shortages across Haiti, St. Damien Pediatric Hospital continued to uphold its mission: to provide quality, safe, and accessible healthcare to the most vulnerable mothers and children. Throughout 2024, and particularly in the challenging fourth quarter, the hospital stood as a beacon of hope and resilience.

Thanks to the unwavering commitment of our medical teams, the hospital remained operational despite significant disruptions, including the departure of qualified personnel and limited access to essential medical equipment.

In July, a new Strategic Management Plan was introduced, creating a framework to stabilize operations, optimize resources, and proactively manage hospital capacity. This plan guided key reforms that strengthened coordination, internal processes, and the overall quality of care.

## Challenges Remained

Despite these successes, challenges remained. The hospital saw an increase in perinatal deaths in neonatology, especially in November, signaling the urgent need to enhance delivery care protocols and strengthen neonatal support systems. Admissions and consultations in neonatal care and HIV services showed a decline, underlining areas for focused investment and improvement.

Nonetheless, 2024 saw important progress across pediatric consultations, malnutrition and tuberculosis programs, and family planning services. Our generating clinics—like the dental clinic—maintained consistent service, while fluctuations in CLIMEDI highlighted the need for ongoing demand analysis.

In the face of adversity, St. Damien Hospital remains a symbol of what is possible when compassion meets strategy, and when dedicated professionals choose courage over despair. Our work is far from over—but thanks to your continued support, we are building a stronger, more resilient healthcare system for the children and families of Haiti.

## Success in Our Focus Areas

### Education & Youth Empowerment

In 2024, eight students graduated from university, including three from the community who are now employed at NPH Honduras. This marks one of the highest numbers of university graduates in recent years. Of the 71 students enrolled in vocational training, 70 successfully earned their certifications, expanding technical education opportunities within the community.

### Disability and Inclusion

The mortality rate among individuals with disabilities has significantly decreased due to improved care. Students with physical disabilities have been integrated into regular classrooms, while those with intellectual disabilities participate in select classes.

### Community Strengthening

The OneFamily program in Olancho has strengthened family engagement, offering parenting workshops not only to NPH families but also to the wider community.  
Health and Well-being

### Health and Wellbeing

Strengthened relationships with public health centers improved access to medical care, and an on-site dentist was hired to enhance healthcare services. Vaccination programs were also expanded, covering hepatitis and HPV immunizations.



## Our Happiest Moment

A proud moment this year was Honduras winning the NPH Gol Por La Paz soccer tournament in Guatemala. The team, a last-minute mix of former NPH youth, university students, and community members, brought together different generations in a powerful display of unity and determination. Their victory was a true testament to teamwork, pride, and the enduring spirit of the Catrachos, leaving everyone beaming with joy and national pride.

## Goals for 2025

Looking ahead, NPH Honduras aims to expand educational support, increase vocational training opportunities, and enhance healthcare services. Strengthening partnerships with local institutions will be crucial to sustaining and improving these programs.

### Education and Development

### Families and Community

In 2024, our school achieved a 96.5% retention rate, demonstrating the commitment of students and staff to academic success. We ensured active student participation in all educational programs, fostering engagement and motivation.

### Youth and Economic Empowerment

Parents actively participated in meetings and follow-ups, strengthening family involvement. Students successfully completed workshops in electricity, welding, computer skills, and English, with all awaiting certification. ## Success in Our Focus Areas

### Residential Care Program



This year, NPH Peru implemented the quasi-family methodology in its Residential Care Program, transitioning from a traditional institutional model to one that mirrors family dynamics. The focus is on the holistic development of children and adolescents, emphasizing emotional, social, educational, and physical well-being. Adolescents engage in life skills training, preparing them for independent and self-sufficient futures.

### Family Empowerment



At the "Padre Wasson" Community Family Center, new initiatives improved family well-being. Academic reinforcement classes in mathematics and communication benefitted 19 children, enhancing their educational performance and confidence. Workshops on financial literacy for 17 mothers supported household financial management, while 44 individuals received dental and ophthalmic care, improving overall health.

## Our Happiest Moment

The Christmas Eve dinner on December 24th, filled with joy and personalized gifts, reinforced the children's sense of belonging. Special anniversary and year-end lunches strengthened staff bonds, fostering a supportive work environment.

In August, families from the Community Center participated in Cañete's 468th anniversary celebration, performing a traditional dance together, creating a meaningful community experience.

## Goals for 2025

Key goals include enhancing local fundraising efforts, increasing successful reintegrations into families, and strengthening family support to ensure children grow in loving, stable homes.

Family Empowerment Program: The target is to expand the program from 17 to 50 families, impacting 200 individuals. New vocational training classes, such as barbering and cosmetology, will help engage young participants and improve economic stability.

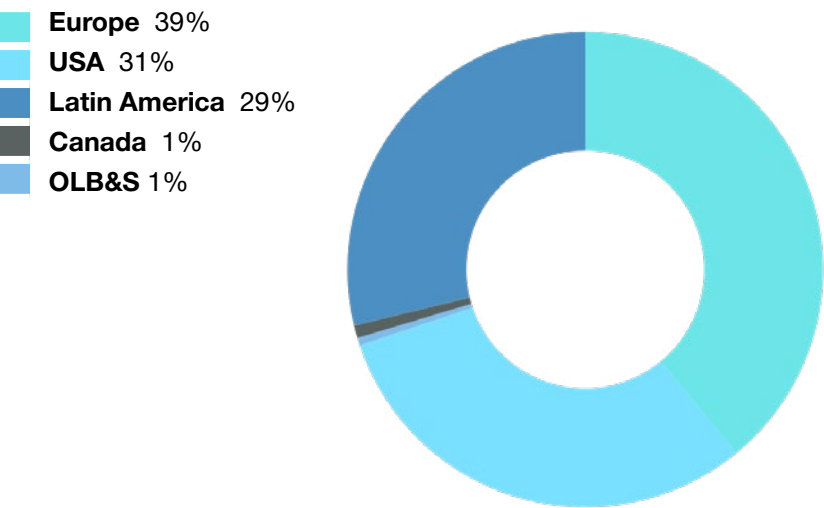

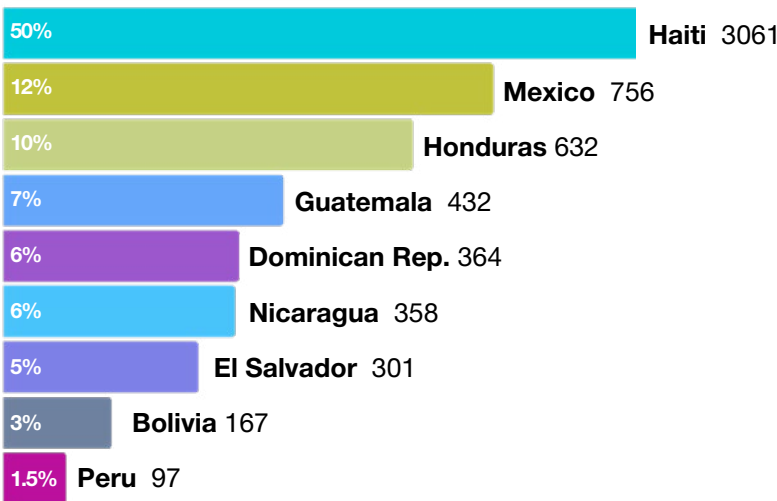

## Financial summary

In 2024, Latin America’s economy expanded by 2.2%, which was slightly higher than the average growth over the past decade but still not enough to catch up with developed economies, according to CEPAL data. Given the slow job creation, including in NPH, we implemented a contingency plan by the end of the year to realign our operations.

Some Latin American and caribbean governments announced minimum wage increases for 2025, which will impact salary costs. As a result, revenue growth and adjustments in operations next year will be crucial to managing salary support in areas not directly affected by these decrees, ensuring operations remain at 2024 levels, this means a starting point for NPH to prioritize our services.

## Key Financial Indicators

- 71%** of Donations came from Fundraising Offices located in USA, Canada and Europe
- 29%** of Donations came from our donors across Latin America, these Donations are made of cash and Donations-in-Kind
- 1.7M** We raised a total of 1.7M of Donations-In-kind.
- 29%** of the total funding are related to operational projects and 2% is related to Capital projects.



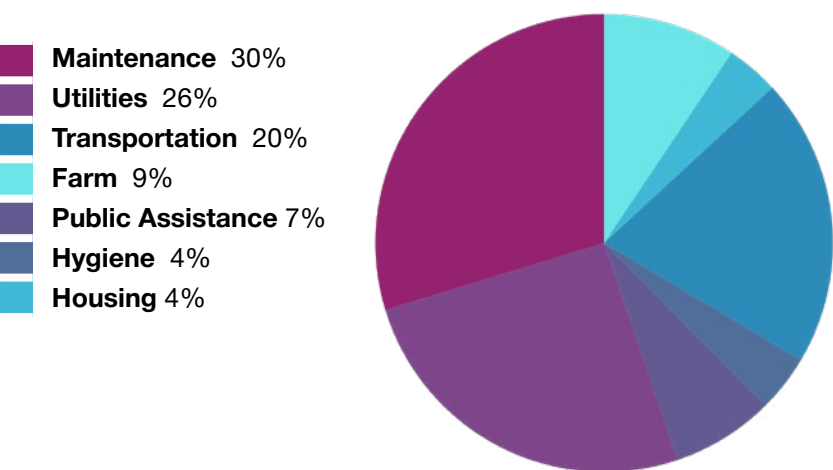
Expenses 2024

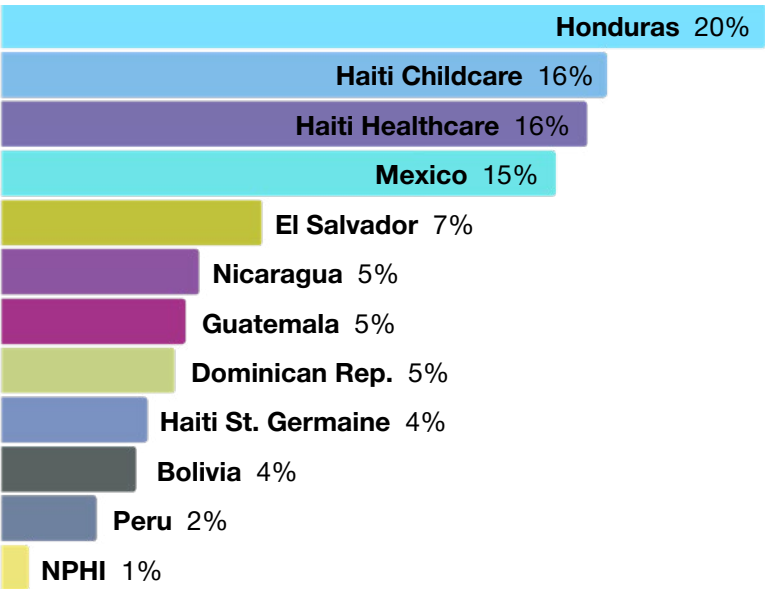


House Services

In addition to its Home, NPFS Haiti also operates a **200-bed pediatric hospital** in Tabarre with public health programs and medical clinics that serve more than **73,000 children** each year.

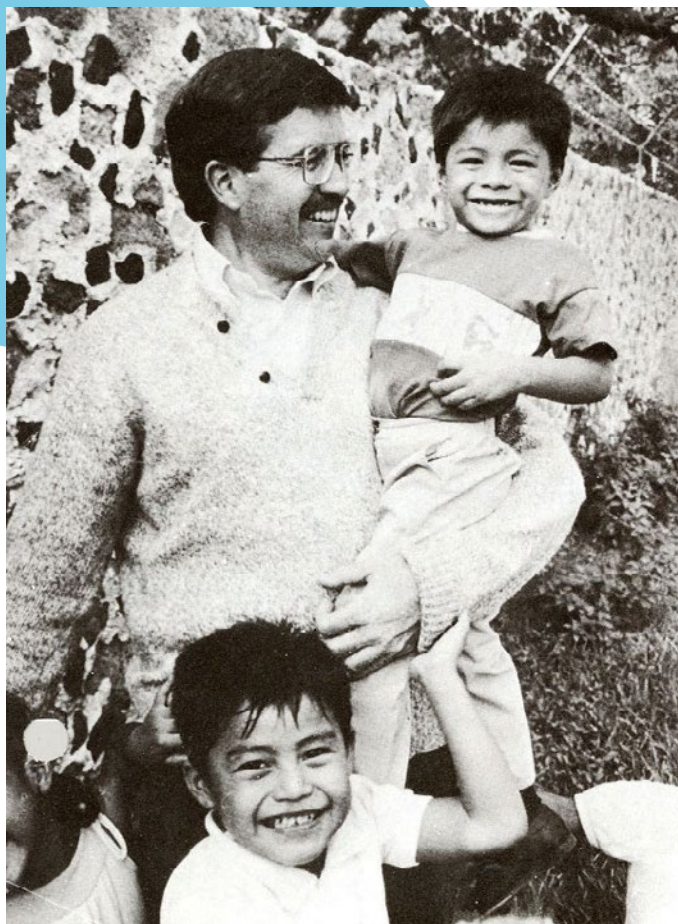

Fr. Phil served for many years as National Director of NPH Mexico before taking on the role of Executive Director of NPH International. Residing at Casa San Salvador in Miacatlán, Morelos, Mexico, he dedicated himself wholeheartedly to the children and young people of NPH. His unwavering commitment earned him the Mercy Mission Award for Outstanding Work with Troubled Youth from Chicago priests and the Community Service Award from the mayor of Cuernavaca, Mexico.

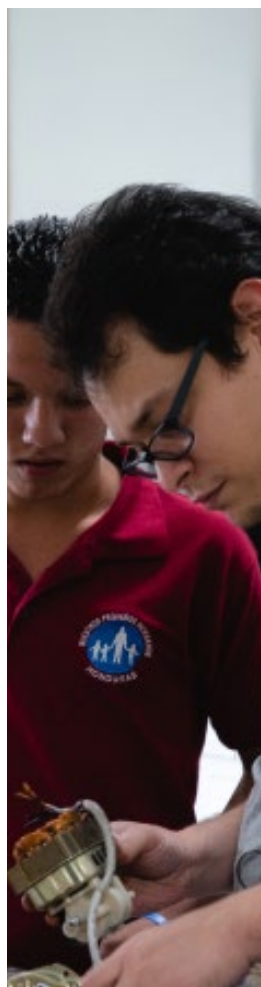
